Strategic Plan

Strategies for the years to come will ensure that our college is well positioned to benefit from, and contribute to, UF's success and remain closely aligned with strategic directions of UF and UF Health. We have engaged two outside experts to assist us. Robert J. Berendt Associates has extensive experience in strategic planning and will serve to facilitate the process and guide the plan's development. Working with Mr. Berendt will be Allison F. Davis, Ph.D., as writer and editor. We look forward to engaging with them, and with all of you, as we move close to a kickoff date and events.

Hospitality & Service Program

Richelle Janiec, director of quality assurance and assistant director of clinical operations, is leading a new initiative on hospitality and service. We are modeling the program after the UF Health program that, since 2013, has trained 13 teams across UF Health Shands and the College of Medicine. The program provides a set of standards that urge us all to help create an even more welcoming and hospitable work environment – no matter where we work across our school. The program addresses four areas: hospitality, teamwork, communication, and professionalism & responsibility.

UF Health is sharing materials and expertise with us - our internal team will tailor the program to suit our college's needs and create a plan for rolling it out. Eventually, all of us will be part of this program and new employees will participate as part of their orientation. The team had its first meeting on August 30 and is learning from other trainers at UF Health. Patient satisfaction surveys continue to give our college high marks; yet we know there is room for improvement. Likewise, our faculty, staff and student surveys tell us we can do even better. I look forward to the program's development and being part of it. DMD Curriculum Revision: Take Two

The eagerly anticipated "re-start" of the DMD curriculum revision has begun. Many of you participated in a rigorous, comprehensive and thoughtful strategy to revise the curriculum several years ago. We halted the process as the accreditation site visit loomed closer and as major changes to the National Board Dental Exam were solidified. During the hiatus, quite a few pilot projects were completed that created a path for our next steps.

A faculty steering committee and several working groups will lead us through a phased approach for implementation. The first phase will focus on one core domain– professionalism. The desired outcomes for this competency domain were defined by a working group that will, working backwards from the professionalism competencies, develop a summative competency assessment plan to evaluate students' attainment of these competencies. Following this, components of the curriculum that build student competency will be planned and developed.

A similar approach will follow for all other aspects of the curriculum, in a staggered sequence, keeping in mind that some elements will be more ready for implementation
