



HIGHLIGHTS

RESEARCH

The UFCD research enterprise ranked seventh nationally among U.S. public dental schools in NIH funding (according to the Blue Ridge Institute for Medical Research) for the federal 2020 fiscal year. For more than 15 years, the college has been ranked in the Blue Ridge top 10. NIH funding comprised 83 percent of all research grants and awards for the college with a total from all sources reaching \$16.7 million.

EDUCATION

UFCD remains a program of choice for applicants from across the state, nation and world. During the last application cycle, the college received more than 3,000 applications for 93 dental student positions and 60 advanced education positions, a 15-percent increase over the previous year.

PATIENT CARE

In a year of challenges related to patient care, UFCD completed 121,114 patient visits, a 9-percent increase over the previous year. UFCD also bridged access-to-oral care gaps for Floridians by launching a teledentistry platform and accepting emergency patients when other dental offices were unable to stay open.

Teledentistry linked faculty to patients with oral health emergencies, allowing faculty to care for patients instead of sending them to emergency departments. After pilot testing the service with existing UFCD patients, the college opened teledentistry to all Floridians. Faculty members included dental students in online patient visits, giving students the experience of providing safe oral care during a public health crisis.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

When COVID-19 descended on Florida, UFCD faculty and dental students went door-to-door in underserved neighborhoods, educating residents about practices to prevent COVID-19 transmission, answering questions and registering people for vaccinations.

The UFCD School-Based Dental Sealant
Program provided preventive dental services
to 555 children at 10 Title 1 elementary and
middle schools in Alachua County. The program
delivered over \$84,000 worth of preventive care
at no cost to patients and included dental exams,
oral hygiene education, placement of dental
sealants, and fluoride varnish application.

In summer 2021, the Community Outreach Team held two Saving Smiles events in Alachua County providing limited restorative and surgical care to children with untreated tooth decay. More than 70 children received over \$14,500 worth of treatment at no cost to their families.

PHILANTHROPY

The UF Go Greater Capital Campaign launched in 2017 and UFCD's share of the total fundraising goal is \$28 million. With a little over a year left in the campaign, the college completed fiscal year 2021 with \$24.3 million in total commitments through June 30, 2021. UFCD continues to have the highest level of participation in alumni giving compared to other UF colleges.

INTERDISCIPLINARY COLLABORATION

Collaboration between health colleges and professions continues to grow along with increasing recognition of the benefits for patient outcomes. Dentistry works with medicine and nursing in clinical settings, and with all five UF health colleges in educational settings on various topics including opioid prescribing, addiction and pain treatment; tobacco cessation; and joint grand rounds for advanced education and graduate residents.

FACULTY HIRING

UFCD hired 16 faculty members: two in community dentistry and behavioral science; one in endodontics; five in restorative dental sciences; two in oral biology; two in orthodontics; one in oral and maxillofacial diagnostic sciences; two in oral and maxillofacial surgery; and one in pediatric dentistry. Searches are in progress for eight positions expected to be filled before the end of the 2022 fiscal year.

ECONOMIC & SOCIETAL IMPACT

A 2020 report by Tripp Umbach illustrated UFCD's economic, employment and government impact in Florida and in the communities we serve. UFCD supports 2,065 jobs, provides \$2.5 million in free or reduced cost dental care, generates \$9.3 million in government revenue, saves \$168.6 million in healthcare costs, and has a \$223.4 million economic impact.

COMMITMENT TO DIVERSITY

UFCD received the Higher Education Excellence in Diversity Award for a sixth consecutive year - a recognition for sustained efforts to foster an inclusive environment and commitment to diversity. Since 2018, underrepresented minority, or URM, students comprise 23 percent of all students, the majority coming from Hispanic backgrounds.

Faculty & Staff

Since July 1, 2020, 29 percent of faculty and 83 percent of staff hires were women. In addition, 42 percent of faculty and 30 percent of staff hires were underrepresented minorities.

Underrepresentation of black faculty is a serious concern and multiple strategies are needed to improve faculty diversity. These include engaging underserved groups/societies to help identify potential candidates and working with the newly established UFCD Inclusion, Diversity, Equity & Access working group. The college also plans increased engagement with alumni of color and participation in college-wide committees and service as courtesy/adjunct faculty.


